Welcome to the seventh edition of our 'Living the Levels' newsletter which will keep everyone who has expressed an interest in the Living Levels Landscape Partnership up to date.

The Partnership aims to recapture, enhance and celebrate the unique Gwent Levels and has successfully been awarded a £2.5 million grant from the National Lottery Heritage Fund.



Tackling Fly-Tipping on the Gwent Levels!

People visit the Gwent Levels to enjoy the quiet setting, watch wildlife, go for a walk or a leisurely bike ride. It's a well-known beauty spot; a place to get away from the bustle of the city. After visiting, most people leave the area clean and tidy, for the next people to be able to enjoy all it has to offer. However, some people do not give the area and the people who live here the respect it deserves. Waste is a problem, with fly tipping being the commonest offence.

That's why we've set-up the Fly-Tipping – 'From Black Spots to Bright Spots' project, which involves a part-time enforcement officer to work with local authorities and partners, to tackle this problem. The project has three ways of working. First, we aim to educate the people living in the area. We visit schools and classrooms, to show children and students the importance of respecting the landscape. Secondly, we raise awareness, and we provide information to the community on how they should be disposing of waste appropriately.

Lastly, we intervene, which involves more direct action. We've installed 'no-fly-tipping' signs, CCTV, operate covert cameras and we organise clean-up operations. The help of volunteers is crucial for this. Thanks to their hard work and dedication, we've been able to remove a huge amount of rubbish from the Gwent Levels. In September, volunteers removed 3.5 tonnes of waste from Duffryn. This was followed by a planting session, where we planted daffodil and wood anemone bulbs on the cleared areas. By doing this, we're removing the 'black spots' of fly-tipping, and replacing with 'bright-spots' of flowers!

Our partners are also playing a key role in preventing further fly-tipping. Recently our partners and project lead, Natural Resources Wales ran a waste carrier stop check operation with South Wales Police, Cardiff Council and Newport Council. They stopped four vans which were carrying waste without a license, and they witnessed rubbish being burned, which will now be investigated. We hope that this will help to change attitudes and have a long-lasting effect on the area.



Big Skies 2019!

To celebrate the Gwent Levels' historical landscape, rich heritage and amazing wildlife, we've partnered up with the Tin Shed Theatre Co. to create Big Skies Community Art Project.

This is a collaboration which aims to bring all of the elements that makes the Gwent Levels special to the public, in a big event filled with performances, stories and live art.

Last year, we held our first Big Skies event at RSPB Newport Wetlands. It was a chance to explore the area and learn more about the wintering migration of birds that live there through the medium of pop-up performances and e xhibitions.

This year, our second Big Skies event was held at the beautiful Caldicot Castle, and 270 people turned up to enjoy. In the afternoon, the audience wandered and explored the castle's grounds, enjoyed pop-up performances, interactive installations and crafty workshops. As dusk settled, writer and performer, Christine Watkins, held a special story-telling session in interior of the castle, which was decorated with striking lanterns. The event culminated with a 'twilight picnic' and a spectacular pyrotechnic and light display.

This was part of the wider Big Skies Community Art Project, which runs for three years. It involves creative workshops with local school children, as well as collaborations with other community groups. This year, we collaborated with local primary schools and Coleg Gwent to make Big Skies a success.

Next year will be the last one for this project, so we'd like to make Big Skies 2020 as amazing as possible. Look out for more information over the coming months.

Rugged Romans and Muddy Monks!

The weather has not been great over the past couple of weeks. We've had blustery and windy days, with plenty of rain to go with it. These were the conditions on Saturday, 28 September at the National Trust's Tredegar House. Fortunately, this did not stop hundreds of people attending the second annual 'Rugged Romans and Muddy Monks' Gwent Levels History Day.

The idea behind the event was to give a wide range of people the opportunity to learn more about the Gwent Levels, from families to the true history buffs. The history of this landscape is remarkable. Way before humans walked this land, the low lying coastal plain was a stomping ground for dinosaurs. Over the following eras, it experienced massive storms and ice ages. During the Mesolithic era, humans started to shape the area, as hunter-gatherers roamed the land looking for prey. The Romans left their mark with their complex system of ditches and reens, which the medieval muddy monks reinstated and since then, people have farmed and made their livelihoods on the Levels, up to today.

This rich past was all on show during the event, and over 600 people got the chance to see some of the ancient remains, artefacts and archaeological finds that helps us understand more about the area's history. There were also re-enactments and the roman soldiers proved to be very popular, especially when they faced off with the massive T-rex dinosaur replica!

The event ran alongside the Cotyledon Food and Craft market, and we were lucky to be in the company of several interesting local groups, each one experts in their own fields. Volunteers of the RATS project were there to share some of their learnings about the 'Recapturing the Historic Landscape' project and 'The Great Flood-1607'. We also had 'Life on the Levels' Oral History Project and Redwick History Group to give a little background on the more recent history of the communities located within the Levels.

Other exhibitors included Gwent Archives, The Coracle Society, Severn Estuary Partnership, Black Rock Lave Net Fishery, Caerleon Museum, Dig Ventures Archaeology, Newport Transporter Bridge, National Museum of Wales, Newport Museum, Newport Medieval Ship. This long list of organisations and societies goes to show the wealth and diversity of history the Gwent Levels has to showcase to the rest of the country.

It was a brilliant event, with plenty to do and see for all the family. We'd like to thank everyone who came on the day, as well as the exhibitors and all who shared their precious knowledge of this unique landscape... and a special thank you to our partners National Trust for hosting the event at the historic Tredegar House.

Restoring nature-rich ditches

One of the most famous features of the Gwent Levels is the ditches, reens and 'grips' that mosaic the landscape.

The Romans started digging these waterways to drain the land for farming. Today, they make excellent habitats for an astonishing diversity of wildlife.





Over the years, some of these ditches have been neglected, reducing the ability to drain the land and the unique diversity of aquatic flora and fauna that depend on these habitats to survive. A special project is now underway to restore 21 km of these ditches over three years. Last year 9 km of ditches were restored on the Caldicot Levels with 7 km planned on the Wentlooge Levels this winter.

These restoration works will certainly be a massive boost to local wildlife, water quality and flood mitigation.

Reviving ancient orchards

Orchards were once an important part of life to the communities of **the Gwent Levels.** The fruit produced were vital to the economy, and the trees provided an important food source for people and wildlife. However, over the years, many of these historical orchards have been lost to development or fallen into disrepair. With the help of volunteers and communities, these orchards are being restored.

This winter new orchards will be planted in four Gwent Levels schools and a community orchard created in Duffryn. Plans for a community enterprise are underway to bring back some of the orchards into business producing local cider, apple juice and apple cider vinegar.

There's also a network of orchard owners and volunteers being developed, with the different orchards of the Gwent Levels being mapped and some apple varieties DNA tested. This will help people share their knowledge and skills while working together to manage and restore healthy orchards across the Levels landscape.

Weaving rush plaited mats 13th and 27th February

10.00am – 4.00pm

Part of our series of discovering traditional Gwent Levels skills, learn how to plait Scirpus lacustris (bulrush) and Typha rushes into nine strand flat plaits to be sewn up into traditional door and bath mats on this 2-day course. You will be taught a variety of plaiting techniques on Day 1 to produce a length of plait which will then be sewn up using jute into durable, attractive mats on Day 2.
